EMC OR-01-34-01 - Hospital pharmacy and clinical pharmacology

Programme (brief description)

Pharmacokinetics (PK) describe how the organism handles a drug, pharmacodynamics (PD) deal with the effects of the drug on the organism. Pharmacogenetics studies the genetic factors that contribute to variability in both pharmacokinetics and pharmacodynamics.

In our research program we are active in all three topics. At present the focus of our activities is in the following areas of interest:

1. Pharmacogenetics, both in epidemiologic studies, as well as in clinical trials.
2. PK/PD studies, in collaborative studies with the departments of neurology, internal medicine, pediatrics, oncology, and dermatology.
3. Medication safety, including studies focused on prescription errors, electronic prescribing, and drug adherence.
4. Chronopharmacology, in collaborative studies with oncology and molecular biology.

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EMC OR-01-39-07 - The allergic immune response and related allergic reactions

Programme (brief description)

The program is focused on the allergic immune response, the pathophysiological backgrounds of allergic disorders and the different forms of intervention. The induction of the allergic reaction by allergens is the basis of research to characterization of allergens, the relation between inhalant and food allergics and the modulation of the allergic reactions. Apart from classical pharmacotherapy and environmental control immunomodulation of the allergic response is the most promising form of intervention.

The main components of research comprise:

Occupational allergy. Erasmus MC has a unique location in a heavily industrialize environment, providing an excellent opportunity for research in occupational allergy.

This is reflected by research to allergy in horticulture and health professionals. Patient care in occupational allergy is organized in a multidisciplinary initiative instituted by the section of Allergology in collaboration with the departments of Dermatology, Pulmonology, ENT and Public health. There is a close connection between this initiative and our research. The focus of research is on the incidence of occupational disease and the effects of occupational disease on sick leave, work performance, costs and health related quality of life. The results of these studies have been published as PhD thesis in the beginning of 2012.

Food allergy. Research focuses on the optimization of diagnostic procedures.

Research objectives are closely related with patient care initiatives. In particular, the

new initiative "Kinderhaven" - collaboration between Allergology, Paediatric Pulmonology and Paediatric Dermatology provides an environment for research to this topic.

Several studies from the section of Allergology focus on the discrepancy between sensitization and clinical allergy. A large study to the positioning of MRA's (mediator release assays) and other tools in the diagnosis of cashew nut allergy is financially supported by STW/NWO. The study has started in 2012

Immunomodulation. The section Allergology is taking part in large scale RCT's to the effectiveness of sublingual immunotherapy. There is collaboration with the dept. of General Practice. A study to the efficacy of sublingual immunotherapy in children allergic to house dust mites has recently been finalised. Another immunotherapy study in children with a grass pollen allergy resulted in a PhD thesis in the beginning of 2012. A large cost- effectiveness study with regard to allergen immunotherapy among adults has been started in 2009. The section of Allergology is taking the lead in this multi-centre study financially supported by ZonMW. The study was finalized at the end of 2012.

The section co-operates with the dept. of Parasitology, LUMC to the role of regulatory B-cells in subcutaneous immunotherapy in asthmatics. At the Erasmus MC the section is collaborating with the dept. of Immunology in a study to the role of IgE bearing B-cells in treatment of patients with either anti-IgE or immunotherapy. With prof. Barbara Bohle (department of Pathophysiology, Medical University of Vienna) the section is studying the clinical and immunological effects of inhalant immunotherapy on cross-reactive food allergy. A clinical responder-analysis to immunotherapy is being carried out. Currently, the section is involved in new studies to the use of anti-IgE and epicutaneous immunotherapy in patients with a peanut allergy.

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EMC OR-01-45-01 - Neurotraumatology and intracranial hydrodynamics

Programme (brief description)

The program is devoted to experimental and clinical research in the field of traumatic brain injury (TBI) and hydrocephalus. The program on TBI focuses on three themes: 1) Trial methodology, guidelines and evidence based medicine, 2) Intensive care monitoring/therapy and neuroprotection, 3) Ethics and outcome. The program on intracranial hydrodynamics mainly concentrates on normal pressure hydrocephalus.

Head injury is the most common cause of death and disability in young adults in the Western world. As such it constitutes a major health and socio-economic problem. The initial trauma initiates complex pathophysiologic mechanisms, leading to secondary brain damage. Basic research has elucidated many of these mechanisms and has resulted in the development of promising neuroprotective agents.

Various of these agents are being tested in our in vitro model of experimental TBI. We have participated in the clinical evaluation of neuroprotective agents. This translational research has proved complex, and none of the randomised controlled trials on neuroprotective agents with demonstrated efficacy in the experimental situation, has shown convincing benefit in the overall population of TBI. Problems in clinical trial design and analysis, specific to the field of TBI may have contributed to this failure. Methodologic challenges are related to the heterogeneity of the population, outcome assessment, detection of treatment effects, the use of surrogate markers and interim analyses. These observations have prompted a significant research effort, organised as an international collaboration based on extensive analyses of data available from studies and trials in TBI encompassing approximately 10.000 patients.

International recognition of the importance of this study was illustrated by the receipt of a NIH RO1 grant for the period 2003-2006.

In the clinical situation cerebral ischemia is considered the central factor in the development of secondary damage. Experimental and clinical programs focus on techniques for monitoring cerebral oxygenation and metabolism. Previous work has demonstrated the value of clinical monitoring of local brain oxygen tension in patients with TBI, and the current research focuses on possibilities to target therapy towards cerebral oxygenation

The third theme of the TBI program focuses on outcome assessment, including evaluation of cognitive functioning, and the development and evaluation of a disease specific scale for quality of life assessment in TBI. Ethical considerations are relevant to neuro-intensive care in general and particularly to the field of neuro-traumatology. The main focus of ethical research and evaluation concentrates on informed consent procedures in acutely incapacitated patients following TBI.

Normal pressure hydrocephalus is a treatable disease common to elderly patients with symptomatology often akin to Alzheimer's disease or vascular dementia. In this theme specific attention is paid to clinical diagnostic criteria and to shunt hydrodynamics. The department of neurosurgery currently co-ordinates a national multi-center study evaluating the use of a programmable shunt device for treatment of normal pressure hydrocephalus.

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EMC OR-01-49-02 - The urinary tract: Physics, function, epidemiology and reconstructive surgery***Programme (brief description)***

The program concentrates on physical and (neuro)physiological modelling of the urinary tract. Models are developed on the basis of measurements in single smooth muscle cells, muscle fibres and complete organ systems in vitro. Passive and active mechanical properties, electrophysiological properties and excitation-contraction coupling are described in this way. The innervation and function of the organ systems are studied in situ in rats using morphological and neurophysiological methods. The models are applied for the development of diagnostic and therapeutic methods in a clinical setting. Epidemiological studies such as 'A longitudinal non-invasive study of changes in urinary bladder contractility secondary to benign prostatic hyperplasia' and 'Non-invasive evaluation of urinary bladder contractility and urethral resistance before and after transurethral resection of the prostate' provide normative data that are important for modelling and clinical analysis as well. In this way function and dysfunction are described quantitatively and new treatment modalities are evaluated objectively. Automated analysis of clinical data and non-invasive diagnostic methods are important issues in the diagnostic field. Currently the non-invasive condom catheter method, perineal noise recording and ultrasonic imaging of velocity and turbulence of the urinary flow using radiofrequency (rf) based techniques and displacement analysis of urethral tissue during voiding are studied and applied. In the therapeutic field, emphasis is placed on the development and evaluation of neural stimulation techniques to modulate organ (dys)function based on neurophysiologic principles and on stemcell therapy of incontinence.

EMC OR-01-54-02 - Pathophysiology and treatment of asthma, atopy and cystic fibrosis

Programme (brief description)

This programme aims (1) to elucidate the etiology and pathogenesis of childhood asthma and asthma-like lung disease and allergy and determining the effects of chronic inflammation on the development and function of the respiratory system and (2) to determine the effects of therapeutic and preventive interventions in chronic inflammatory lung disease and atopy in children.

Chronic lung disease, especially asthma, is one of the leading causes of chronic morbidity in children. Childhood asthma and other obstructive lung diseases predispose for obstructive lung disease in adults, an important health care issue with great socioeconomic impact. The search for causal and contributing factors, development of new diagnostic techniques and the determination of optimal treatment modalities for childhood asthma and allergy has the potential to improve morbidity and prognosis, and thus to reduce the burden of these diseases. In this respect, the development and validation of new techniques to measure lung function and airway inflammation in infants and young children has priority.

Infant lung function testing and new image analysis techniques using CT scan are developed as sensitive, objective endpoints for assessment of airway inflammation and damage. The development of structural lung damage is studied in a cohort of CF patients using CT and extensive lung function testing.

Inhalation of aerosolized medication is an important aspect of the treatment of lung disease, and poses specific problems in the pediatric age group. In this project, we examine the factors that determine lung deposition and effects of inhaled drugs in young children to optimize the effects of treatment.

The therapeutic and preventive intervention studies carried out within this project are important for specific patient groups (asthma, cystic fibrosis), and have impact for the treatment of childhood obstructive lung disease in primary and secondary health care practice.

The development of allergic diseases with age is studied in two large birth cohorts (Prevention and Incidence of Asthma and Mite Allergy, "PIAMA", and "Generation R"). These focus on interaction of genetic and environmental factors in relation to immunopathology and clinical phenotypes

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EMC OR-01-58-01 - Applied social and forensic psychiatry***Programme (brief description)***

This research programme comprises applied social and forensic psychiatry.

Since 2007, the Research Center O3 (a collaboration between mental health organisations in the Rijnmond region, the municipal health center and the department of Psychiatry) carries out studies in the field of public mental health. The main aim of the research center is to study difficult to engage populations with severe mental illness in the public domain as well as in the mental health services domain. This includes studies related to public mental health issues such as social breakdown and self neglect, and help seeking behaviour (using the Rijnmond Case Register data), effects of different organisational models for assertive outreach, interventions to increase compliance with treatment, the epidemiology and prevention of involuntary admissions and coercive measures in psychiatry and victimisation of psychiatric patients. Populations studied include the general population, and outpatient in inpatient patients with severe mental illness. A strong focus is on developing and testing new interventions, especially for difficult to engage patients with severe mental illness.

Within the forensic psychiatric research, determinants of violent behaviour, persistent delinquency in adolescents, treatment effects, and the epidemiology of criminality in combination with mental health care are studied. Diagnosis, treatment and risk profiling are the main areas of research in forensic psychiatry. The group has two main themes in this field, the development of criminal careers for juvenile and adult offenders and psychiatric determinants of violent behaviour, with special interest for the translation of empirical research findings into clinical practice. By means of a multidisciplinary approach, psychotic offenders, antisocial personality disordered patients and psychopaths are discriminated regarding the start of their offending behaviour related to the onset of their mental disorder and regarding psychiatric precursors of violence. Results should lead to a better indication and programming of forensic psychiatric treatment. Special attention is given to the complexity of sexual offending, as a phenomenon limited to adolescence, persistent adult offending with or without other non-sexual offenses, and the specific influence of cognitive distortions on sexual offending. The focus of our research group is on how this subtype differs from other subtypes within sex offenders with respect to psychiatric disorders. Further studies are directed at the role of attachment problems and personality disorders in domestic violence offenders.

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EMC OR-01-59-01 - Epidemiology and biology of oral and maxillofacial tissues

Programme (brief description)

Experimental research

1. Effects of hyperbaric oxygen therapy on the viability of irradiated head and neck tissues and on tumor development. In a mouse model the role of hyperbaric oxygen is examined in order to prevent the negative side effects of radiotherapy of the hard and soft tissues in the head and neck region. In addition the effects of hyperbaric oxygen on the growth and metastatic potential of (irradiated) tumors are studied.
2. Bone tissue engineering. The process of bone formation by mesenchymal stem cells (MSCs) is studied in relevant models in order to create new therapies for large bone defects.

Clinical research

1. Craniofacial anomalies. Robin sequence and hemifacial microsomia are rare congenital craniofacial disorders with unclear prevalence of obstructive sleep apnea (OSA). Patients are monitored in order to identify subgroups for early surgery to overcome the OSA. Cleft is the most frequent craniofacial anomaly. Outcomes of cleft treatment, surgical aspects and patient satisfaction are addressed.
2. Orthognathic surgery. Maxillary and mandibular (distraction) widening. In a prospective clinical study the outcomes of combined orthodontic-surgical treatments are evaluated.
3. Trauma. In a prospective randomized clinical trial two materials for reconstruction of orbital wall fractures are explored: autogenous bone from the iliac crest is compared with titanium.

Epidemiology

The Generation R Study is a prospective cohort study that is designed to identify early environmental and genetic causes of normal and abnormal growth, development and health. In 2012 the project focuses on 9-year-olds has started with involvement of our Department.

1. Facial 3D. Quantitative facial measurements will be extracted from 3D images and linked to the available genome-wide SNP markers. The role of various determinants on facial development will be investigated.
2. Orthodontic needs/looks. The child's perception of facial/orthodontic looks and oral function is measured by questionnaires and related to objective orthodontic need measured by 3D facial images.

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EMC OR-01-60-01 - Diagnosis and treatment of disorders of the posterior segment and strabismus

Programme (brief description)

Studies of cornea, uveal melanoma, macular diseases and strabismus

Ways are sought to prolong the survival of corneal grafts by local modulation of the immune response. Therefore, cellular and humoral immunity is examined in experimental corneal allograft rejection.

In a prospective and retrospective study of uveal melanoma patients the relation between chromosomal abnormalities and survival are analysed with molecular biology techniques. The detection of these chromosomal abnormalities in fine needle biopsies is validated with fluorescent in-situ hybridisation in collaboration with the Universities of Sheffield and Liverpool. Target genes like p16, p73 and pten are investigated. In a prospective study the control rate and complication rate is studied in uveal melanoma patients treated by stereotactic radiotherapy.

The pathogenesis of age-related macular degeneration (AMD) was studied in een group of very old. Macaque monkeys. Molecular mechanisms that causes senescence in the retina, apoptosis and the expression of somatostatin receptor 2A are studied. Somatostatin receptor binding may inhibit angiogenesis in AMD. A pilot study was performed with octreotide treatment for the control of subfoveal choroidal neovascularisation in AMD in men. A two-center prospective randomized masked trial is initiated to investigate its clinical effect. The study of the effect of adjuvant hormonal treatment in surgery for macular holes is ongoing.

The study of strabismus consists of three multicenter and cohort studies: Together with the University of Heidelberg a study is organised to address the question whether children with congenital strabismus should be operated early or late, involving 54 European clinics (1992-2002). A second randomized study is organised that compares the two surgical techniques that are most commonly used in congenital strabismus, in 9 German and 4 Dutch clinics (1997-2002). A new microelectronic device has been developed that measures compliance in patch wearing in children with amblyopia; a cohort study has been initiated to measure compliance in the treatment of amblyopia.

Intensive care is an indispensable health care provision. Mortality rates and morbidity typically are high.

Every aspect of this specialism is continuously subject to new developments and views and opinions are subject to rapid changes. The developments are characterised by their multidisciplinary and technological nature. Recovery of intensive care patients requires optimal gas exchange and supply of nutrients to the tissues. The research efforts in a broader sense are aimed at technological improvements for optical tissue characterization for diagnosis and guidance of clinical procedures, non-invasive blood analysis, patient monitoring and rapid diagnosis of clinically relevant microorganisms for optimal patient treatment and infection control.

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EMC OR-01-86-13 - Palliative and supportive care***Programme (brief description)***

Palliative care aims to improve the quality of life of patients and their relatives in case of life-threatening disease. Because of the complexity of problems, multidisciplinary partnership is considered of utmost importance. When the underlying disease is still responsive to specific therapy, supportive care will be given to enhance the patient's quality of life by (symptomatic) treatment of concurrent disease- or therapy-induced complications. The research programme includes studies on the prevalence of symptoms and psychosocial problems in cancer patients at different stages during the course of disease, their needs and perceived quality of life and the development of clinical interventions to achieve symptom control in these patients. Specific attention is given to the development of effective interventions for chemotherapy-induced complications, medical and nurse-initiated interventions in pain and fatigue management, the use of a care pathway for the dying and end-of-life decisions.
